TAPORI is a worldwide network of children whose motto is:

"We want all children to have the same chances!"

The name Tapori was chosen by Joseph Wresinski as a sign of solidarity with the poorest children. Joseph Wresinski, founder of the International Movement ATD Fourth World, grew up in poverty. While travelling in India, he met very poor children called *Taporis* who lived in train stations and who supported each other. He later wrote to other children:

"You are like the Taporis when you look out for others.

You can find ways to make the world a better place and get rid of poverty."

Today, thousands of children between 7 and 13 years old, across many different countries and continents, are connected through the Tapori newsletter.
