Hundreds of children answered and sent a franc or sometimes more. Some children said that they wanted to be friends with André and children like him.

Many letters arrived in the camp; some even came from other countries. It was amazing!

After this, Joseph Wresinski, the founder of ATD Fourth World, together with Francine and other full time volunteers like Georgette, wrote a letter to answer the children who had written. It was also sent to other children. Over 1000 letters were sent. That first letter became the Taporî newsletter.
